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Printmaking National and John Boyd Exhibitions to Open July 7

WICHITA, Kan. — Mark Arts will open its Printmaking National Exhibition on Friday, July 7. The exhibition, which is underwritten by the Fred and Mary Koch Foundation, will remain on display through August 13.

The public is invited to an opening reception from 6:30 to 8 p.m. on July 7, during which instructor Doug Billings will offer a hands-on printmaking demonstration sponsored by the Gordon W. Evans Charitable Trust. Juror Sarah Riley of Wellfleet, Massachusetts, will give a talk on printmaking at 7 p.m. at Mark Arts, 9112 E. Central Ave.

Printmaking is a Mark Arts course area with a long and storied history stemming from the involvement of C.A. Seward in the launch of the famed Prairie Print Makers. Seward was president of Mark Arts, then known as the Wichita Art Association in 1932-33, not long after he and 10 other Kansas artists formed the Prairie Print Makers in Birger Sandzen's Lindsborg studio. Within a few years, the group had nearly 150 active and associate members.

Today at Mark Arts, the tradition continues with the Tallgrass Prairie Press. Community members are encouraged to learn more about this art form. Printmaking is not a photographic reproduction of a painting. Printmakers transfer ink through prepared screens, which can be made from metal, wood, linoleum, silk and more.

Riley, the juror, selected 84 works for exhibition and conferred the following awards:

SECOND PLACE – \$750: Running on Empty by David Avery of San Francisco

HONORABLE MENTION – \$250: RedDan I by Chloe McEldowney of Peoria, Illinois; Untitled II by Cynthia Milionis of San Francisco; and Selfie Portrait: Hashtag Meme by Mark Sisson of Stillwater, Oklahoma

Mark Arts also will open its concurrent John Boyd Exhibition on July 7. John Boyd (1939-2012) was a specialist in lithography with a funky style who brought national recognition to Wichita State University's printmaking program. "A cartoon style fits my art approach because of its directness, simplicity and clarity," Boyd once said.
